What are the rules of Digital Etiquette?

There are several core values associated with Digital Etiquette:

- Avoid language that may come across as strong or offensive.
- Keep writing to a point. Stay on topic.
- Read first, write later.
- Review, review, then send.
- Remember that an online classroom is still a classroom.
- Know the language of the internet.
- Consider the privacy of others.
- If possible, keep attachments small.
- Do not send, forward, or post inappropriate materials.
